I am a staff member at Ivy Road Primary School, I've seen firsthand the incredible impact this school has on our students, families, and the wider community. Closing the school or considering a merger wouldn't be the best solution. A merger would likely lead to significant changes in the school's culture, curriculum, and community dynamics, potentially disrupting the education and well-being of our students. Additionally, integrating two schools can be logistically challenging, from combining staff (which wasn't even an option to us IRPS staff members being told we wouldn't be kept on unless needed by FH Primary school which couldn't be more unfair) and resources to managing different teaching styles and school traditions. Given the strong sense of identity and community that Ivy Road Primary School has built, a merger could dilute what makes our school special and effective. Instead of exploring closure or merger, I believe we should focus on finding ways to support and strengthen our school, ensuring it continues to thrive and provide the high-quality education our students deserve. Alongside this I have a permanent contract at Ivy Road Primary School, yet I'm deeply concerned about the uncertainty and utter disregard surrounding our school and staff member's future's whether they're permanent or fixed term, I feel as if we have been dismissed without choice. Again how is this fair? What's often overlooked in these discussions is the impact on the staff who work tirelessly to provide the best education for our students. We are not just employees; we are people with families, mortgages, and responsibilities. Yet, we have been left without a voice or a meaningful say in the decision-making process. The lack of

consultation and transparency has been disheartening, and many of my colleagues including myself are now anxious about what lies ahead not just for our students and families but for ourselves too. We understand the challenges the school may be facing, but we believe that our experience and dedication should be valued and considered in any discussions about the school's future. We want to work collaboratively to find solutions that benefit everyone involved, including our students, families, and the staff who care for them.

I would like the Council to consider an alternative proposal that builds on Ivy Road Primary's existing strengths in supporting children with additional needs. The school already has a higher-than-average proportion of pupils with SEND and social, emotional, and behavioural needs, and has developed significant staff expertise in these areas. Rather than closing the school, the Council could explore developing a specialist unit or inclusion hub within Ivy Road to serve children with SEND or behavioural needs across the wider area. There is currently a shortage of such provision locally, which places pressure on mainstream schools and limits parental choice. In addition, Ivy Road is the only school that has a growing catchment area and has the establish building space to take on this role. Establishing a small resource base or behaviour support centre could help secure the school's long-term sustainability by attracting pupils from a wider catchment, while addressing a clear gap in local provision. This would maintain educational continuity for current pupils and allow the Council to meet its statutory duties for inclusive education in a cost-effective way. I therefore suggest that, before considering closure, the Council works with Ivy Road's leadership and community to assess the feasibility of this model and seek relevant funding streams (for example, SEND improvement or inclusion grants).

But that there is a complete lack of care and empathy for the students and teachers at Ivy Road. All we are told is that this is just a proposal and not all decisions are made. But teachers of Ivy Road have all been told that they face redundancy from the merger. This means that Forest Hall staff and students have all the certainty about how they will be taught and who by and Ivy Road students and parents have absolutely none. The worst case scenario is that in January you announce the merger and teachers from Ivy Road naturally start looking for new jobs and leaving. While I acknowledge that the legal requirement for Ivy Road to close is tied to the academy order, I am deeply concerned about the current proposal which designates Forest Hall as the continuing school and site for the merged provision. This proposal raises several serious issues that risk negatively impacting both school communities, the staff, and, most importantly, the children. 1. Equality and Identity: A Fair Merger The decision for one school to retain its identity (Forest Hall) while the other closes (Ivy Road) is deeply unfair to the children, staff, and families of Ivy Road. This approach risks creating a sense of inequality and loss for the Ivy Road community, and could hinder efforts to foster unity among pupils from both schools. To ensure a truly inclusive and equal merger: • A new name for the merged school should be considered. • A new uniform, shared vision, ethos, and values should be introduced, giving all children a fresh start on an equal footing. • This mirrors the approach taken in the Hazelwood and Greenfields merger, where a new identity will be formed. It is unclear why a different, less balanced approach is being proposed here, and clarification would be welcomed. 2. Curriculum and Educational Continuity The two schools currently use different curriculum packages and teaching methods. A sudden shift in approach for Ivy

Road pupils—without careful transition and support—could disrupt their learning and emotional well-being. It is essential to:

- Plan a phased and inclusive transition to any new curriculum.
- Provide targeted support to ensure all children adapt without experiencing educational disadvantage.

3. Staffing and Fair Employment Opportunities

The proposal places staffing decisions under the remit of Forest Hall's governing body, which is likely to result in the majority of Ivy Road staff losing their jobs. This not only disadvantages experienced professionals who have built relationships with the children but also risks losing valuable institutional knowledge and continuity of care. A truly fair merger should:

- Open up all staffing roles to applicants from both schools, with an equitable and transparent recruitment process.
- Prioritise continuity and inclusion by valuing the contributions of all staff, regardless of their originating school.

4. Early Years Provision: Continuity and Capacity

Ivy Road Primary currently provides high-quality early years education, including a provision for 2-year-olds and a Nursery, which manages its own admissions. This is a vital service in the community, with full cohorts and waiting lists projected into 2026. Forest Hall does not currently offer 2-year-old provision, and there are limited alternatives nearby. Questions that must be addressed include:

- Can Ivy Road Primary continue to admit into the 2-year-old and Nursery provision beyond September 2026?
- If not, how will the loss of this provision be mitigated to avoid disruption for children, families, and working parents?
- If the early years provision is removed prematurely:
- There will be a significant gap in access to early education, especially for disadvantaged families.
- Current pupils could face disruption, being required to leave their school prematurely and return later.
- Families may choose to remove older siblings to maintain continuity, further fragmenting the school community.

In Conclusion This merger must be handled in a way that is equitable, inclusive, and child-focused. Without significant adjustments to the current proposal, the merger risks creating division rather than unity, and loss rather than opportunity. I urge the local authority and decision-makers to:

- Reconsider the merger model to create a new, shared identity for both communities.
- Ensure curriculum continuity and emotional support for all pupils.
- Offer fair employment opportunities to staff from both schools.
- Retain or replace the essential 2-year-old provision currently offered at Ivy Road.

I hope these concerns will be taken seriously and that the final decision reflects the best interests of all children and families affected.

Having had the opportunity to read the information on the proposal to relocate FHPS, whilst I have some concerns over how the proposal has been explained, I do wish to express my support in principle for the proposals [REDACTED]. The proposal is for the closure of Ivy Road Primary School, which is sadly subject of an inadequate judgement from OFSTED and an academy order (with no identified sponsor) and the relocation of FHPS to the Ivy Road site. I recognise that school staff & parents in our community, and across the Borough, are feeling anxious at this time and I do not underestimate how emotive the proposal is. Every parent wants the best for their child. My support for the proposal is based the ability to continue to offer high quality primary education to the children of the Forest Hall and Palmersville community being at the heart of the proposal. FHPS was rated good by OFSTED at its last inspection in November 2021 and has continued to see good results across all year groups including at key milestones for Y6 and Y1 phonics. The proposal offers the opportunity for this good quality education to be accessible to our community which may otherwise see existing schools continue to decline in numbers and funding. A move brings inevitable disruption and it is disappointing to potentially move from the FHPS site where a school has stood for over 100 years and which was extended in 2014 to provide permanent, modern accommodation for our EY and KS1 children. However, the Ivy Road site is larger both in terms of the school building and grounds and so can accommodate a 1-2 form entry primary school. In terms of its location, it has been explained that the Ivy Road site is the more central location for the Forest Hall & Palmersville community. This makes sense. The current school buildings are aging and I know children, parents, staff and governors will want to make sure that the accommodation is fit for purpose and ready to support higher occupancy. Both FHPS and Ivy Road have seen a consistent decline in pupil numbers over the last few years. These are not the only primary schools in the area and there is an increasing pressure to attract pupils from a dwindling pool given the low birth rate. It has been explained that both schools currently have a significant surplus of places, and this is set to continue as the birth rate falls. This has had a dramatic impact on the funding available to both schools. Currently funding for each pupil is £3824. FHPS has around 77 unfilled places which amounts to lost income of around £294,000. Despite this, the school currently continues to offer single year cohorts from nursery through to Y6, funding teaching and support staff for each of the seven year groups. More than half the year groups have less than 20 children but the teaching requirement

and cost is the same as for a class of 30 children but with less income. Carrying a deficit budget is not down to poor management by the school leaders and governors. Scope for savings to be made is a constant pressure and has meant that access to outside activities and events for the children has had to be reduced alongside staff access to training events to support their continued professional development. The price of school meals has also had to be increased and parents are charged (at cost) for breakfast and after school clubs. Staffing is the biggest cost to any school and to manage the budget, FHPS reviewed its staffing structure and had to take the disappointing step of making a teaching staff redundancy in 2025. If pupil numbers, and hence funding, continue to fall, it would be expected that further staff savings would have to be found alongside further reductions to non-essential spending. It is possible that as pupil numbers continue to fall it will not be affordable to continue to run single cohorts and there would most likely be a need to run mixed year groups. Mixed year groups are not uncommon, but it is my belief that children should, wherever possible, learn in their own year groups where they can focus on an age appropriate curriculum and teaching to support them to achieve the best progress and attainment. Whilst small classes might mean children get more personal attention, outcomes are ultimately linked to the quality of teaching. Smaller classes can also mean children may build a smaller group of friends and socialise less and have access to fewer extracurricular activities. The retention of two LA maintained one form entry schools in the community is not sustainable in the long term. It is certain that both will see further reductions to their roll and budgets. This is likely to impact on the morale of staff and pupils and the loss of experienced teachers. The future of both schools would become increasingly uncertain. Children in the community may be pushed further from home to other schools, and it might become more difficult for parents to get siblings into the same school. I believe that children should be educated in their local community wherever possible. It means they have the chance to make friends who live nearby enabling them to play and as they become more independent, socialise locally and develop friendships which can last a lifetime. The children from both schools already come together at Longbenton High School in Y7 when they join children from other nearby primary schools. The proposal to relocate FHPS and bring the children from both schools together offers a more sustainable future for high quality primary education in our community. There are clear cost efficiencies for running a 1.5-2 form entry school. Whilst a larger teaching and support staff than currently exists in either school is likely to be needed, operational costs can be managed more efficiently. FHPS was rated good in all areas by OFSTED in 2021 – quality of education, behaviour and attitudes, personal development, leadership and management and early years provision. School leaders were described as ambitious and determined and pupils were seen to be

respectful of the staff and of each other. They felt safe and said bullying was rare. The school environment was calm and purposeful. Improvements have continued since 2021, with FHPS having recently been awarded school of sanctuary in recognition of its good practice in fostering a safe and inclusive environment. Rather than see this quality of provision decline with reducing funding, this culture, environment and quality of teaching can be expanded. The proposal provides the opportunity for our community to continue to access good quality education in a local setting. I am mindful that there will be likely to be some job losses and changes which some children may find it more difficult to adapt to. This is a very sensitive time for us all. We have been assured by the LA team that support will be made available to all the children if the proposal is agreed and the GB will expect to see support provided by the LA. The proposal would be a big change on many levels. People are likely to feel degrees of a sense of loss with the changes. Forest Hall school has been on its site for a long time & there are psychological attachments to the building. Pupils at Ivy Road will have to handle some staff changes and will need support to cope with new challenges as they adapt to a new learning environment. The FHPS staff team has worked hard and collaboratively to achieve the good OFSTED rating and outcomes for our children and I know that they will bring their skills and enthusiasm to make bringing the children from both schools together a success. I would encourage the community to support the proposal and continue to sustain both schools in readiness for bringing the children together.

This would mean a new shared identity for both schools and their communities and would mean that the 'merger' is inclusive and does not disadvantage or discriminate against former Ivy Road Primary pupils. I also have concerns about how if the closure and 'merger' of the schools goes ahead the impact it will have on the current pupils at Ivy Road. Potentially they will be in a building which will require building work done to it to accommodate the larger primary school and could have to deal with upheaval and disruption as the work takes place. Potentially staff might leave due to them seeking employment elsewhere as they are losing their jobs. This will have a negative impact on morale, staffing levels and the continuity of education for the pupils. I feel that Ivy Road pupils and staff are sadly going to get the raw deal with this proposal as they face all the uncertainty, upheaval and many changes whilst Forest Hall Primary pupils and staff get to continue as they are until their 'new' school building is ready for them to move into. As a member of staff I worry about the impact the proposed closure and 'merger' will have on our pupils and wish to ensure that we strive to limit the negative impact as much as we can but feel that in order to do that we need support from the education authorities and that they need to ensure that our pupils are valued, treated with respect and not put at any more disadvantage than is unavoidable. As a parent I feel the same and I worry whether my children's education is going to be compromised. I have one child currently at Ivy Road and she is loving school and is making good progress and I do not want her education, confidence and happiness to be impacted unfairly. I also have concerns about my son who is due to start Reception in September 2027 as potentially that is when the proposed closure and 'merger' will have taken place and I worry that any delays to this proposed process will mean he starts school in chaos and uncertainty and I do not want that for him or any child. I ask for the education authorities to please work with both Ivy Road Primary and Forest Hall Primary schools staff and pupils to ensure the best possible outcomes for everyone involved are achieved. This is a stressful, emotional and challenging time for both schools and everyone needs to be involved with ensuring that ALL pupils and staff are are treated equally with respect, dignity and support. The proposed closure of Ivy Road Primary School has had a profound impact on me both professionally and personally. As a dedicated member of staff, I feel deeply saddened and frustrated by how this process has been handled and by the potential consequences for our pupils, families, and staff team. All staff at Ivy Road have been informed that we will lose our jobs if the closure goes ahead. This has created enormous uncertainty and distress, especially given how committed we are to the children and families we serve. Many of us have devoted years to building trusting relationships with pupils who often struggle in larger or less supportive environments. Being told that our jobs will simply disappear feels neither fair nor appropriate, and it has been very difficult to remain motivated and hopeful in these circumstances. I have personally been advised that I cannot apply for a mortgage due to this instability, which has had a significant effect on my own future plans. My greatest concern, however, is for the children. Ivy Road serves a community with high levels of additional need, including many pupils with SEND and social, emotional, and behavioural difficulties. These children have made real progress in our small, nurturing environment where they are known, understood, and supported by staff who have specialist experience and strong relationships with parents and carers. If the school closes, these bonds — which have taken years to establish — will be torn apart. Many of our parents have already expressed anxiety about this and, as a result, some have withdrawn their children or chosen not to enrol new ones. This has contributed to a further fall in pupil numbers — not because of any lack of quality or care at Ivy Road, but because of uncertainty and a loss of trust in the proposed merger. They also do not agree with the ethos of the school stating that if they wanted their child to go they they would have, however they chose Ivy Road. It also feels unjust that Ivy Road is being closed largely because it has been rated 'Inadequate', while Forest Hall has not had a recent Ofsted inspection (last done in 2021 and prior to this was required improvement). Ivy Road is working tirelessly to improve and remove this grading. This makes it difficult to accept that the merger is in the best educational interests of pupils. It feels as though the process has been driven by administrative convenience and financial pressures rather than by what is right for children. The relationship between our staff and our families is something truly special. Parents often tell us that this is the first school where they have felt listened to and supported. They trust us with their children because we take the time

to understand their needs and circumstances. That trust cannot simply be transferred to another school. Overall, this proposal has caused deep distress for pupils, parents, and staff alike. It threatens to dismantle a caring and inclusive community that has worked tirelessly to support some of the most vulnerable children in our area. I urge the Council to reconsider this decision and to work with us to find a fairer and more constructive alternative that protects both our pupils' wellbeing and the livelihoods of those who care for them.

The creation of a new school would facilitate a smoother transition for all pupils, fostering a shared identity and sense of belonging from the outset. Ensuring a positive transition experience for all children, particularly those with additional or high needs, should remain a central priority. Furthermore, staffing arrangements should be managed equitably across both schools, ensuring fairness and avoiding a situation in which only Ivy Road staff face job losses as a result of the merger.
